


THE ROLE OF THE NATIONAL TRUST OF FIJI & KEY STRATEGIES

THE ROLE OF NTF

- To promote the permanent preservation (sustainability) for the benefit of the nation, all natural, cultural and built heritage (including reefs).
- The protection and augmentation of the amenities of any such land or buildings and their natural surroundings and to preserve their natural aspects and features.
- To protect animal and plant life: and
- To provide for the access to and enjoyment by the public of such natural resources, native species and cultural or built heritage in the country.

- Visitor attractions like the new Momi Bay Guns information center provides a portal into the past of our history and heritage.
- Community engagement through corporate social responsibility can influence consumer choice and conservation efforts by tourism in the country will appeal to those that chose Fiji as a holiday destination.

Key Strategies of NTF

- Developing destination partnerships with the private sector in particular the tourism industry, as NTF believes tourism can underpin conservation in the country.
- A multi-stakeholder approach whereby all parties interested in a destination as a resource look at how they can work together to achieve a common goal of "sustainability".
- Nurturing the need to connect with Nature through a national identity of inclusiveness that encourages all citizens to take ownership, be empowered with our environment and cultivate civic pride.
- Rejuvenation of heritage sites that become places for restoring and building resilience against the effects of climate change and disasters.

Key Strategies of NTF

- Strengthening partnerships with NGO's like Nature Fiji, WWF and Conservation International to achieve strategic alignment of our areas of responsibility.
- Gaining greater support from local Government through grants and financial assistance or climate financing such as ECAL.
- Building stronger ties with traditional landowners for places like the Sovi Basin (Fiji's largest protected forest).
