nancial statement analysis, appraising investment proposals through relevant valuation techniques and interpreting and understanding listed entity market announcements and using it effectively to make informed investment decisions and/or to compile adept business stories.

The Training will be facilitated by Professor Erik Larson from Macalaster College in Minnesota, United States of America (USA). Professor Larson is the co-director of Macalester's Legal Studies Programme.

Professor Larson is well versed with the operations of the capital markets in Fiji having conducted various research assignments since the year 2000.

For over 19 years, he has closely followed developments at the SPSE.

He began this long-term commitment in 2000 while conducting in-depth research on the capital markets in Fiji.

This initial research included attachments with the stock exchange, brokerage firms, market regulator, and institutional investors and also involved detailed archival research on the stock exchange.

This research was part of a comparative study of the emergence and operation of stock exchanges in Fiji, Ghana, and Iceland, which became his Ph.D. thesis.

Additionally, Professor Larson has published articles in top-10 ranked peer-reviewed journals from this research project.

He has worked with the SPSE on a number of projects during the past several years and also possesses practical experience having served as a director of both listed entities and non-listed companies in Fiji.
